

The Dangerous Life of a Pastor (and of Christians)

I bet most of you think life as a pastor is easy: They work one day a week (completely untrue!), get to lecture people regularly (somewhat true) and get to wear snazzy black clericals (definitely true). Well, life is not always so easy! Being a pastor is fraught with peril, take the following story:



In between services I got to head over to the local Lutheran nursing home to preach a mini version of my epic sermon. I got it down to 3 minutes and was shaking hands of the residents as they left the service. Now please understand that I was wearing my white alb with the rope around my waist. Let me tell you: Ropes around the waist and wheelchairs DO NOT go together.

One resident wheeled off in such a hurry that my rope got caught in her wheels! I had two choices: Run alongside her or get dragged down the hallway at three miles per hour. It was a beautiful sight to behold, me pleading with a woman hard of hearing and in an apparent hurry. I think she heard me but needed to exact revenge.

So as you can plainly see, pastors do not have it easy. But before you think I am trying to win sympathy, let me share a passage with you: But you are a chosen people, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people belonging to God, that you may declare the praises of him who called you out of darkness into his wonderful light. 1 Peter 2:9

The truth of the matter is that although I am called to be a pastor, you are called to be in the priest-hood of all believers! That means that your life is in danger also because living in the Gospel and sharing the Gospel is never without risk. Sure, maybe you won't get caught in a nursing home accident but you will be challenged in life with unexpected twists and turns!

You will encounter people and be tempted to give them an epic sermon: Assuming they have never heard the Gospel before or ever will again. But thanks be to God that He grants His Spirit to give us the right words as we share His love with others. I ask that you pray for those in harm's way: Your pastor, your fellow church members and yourself! Life is like a room filled with whirling wheelchairs and you are wearing really long ropes around your waist! I told you it was dangerous.




hope to have members bring out some photos and memorabilia to share in a display! Please contact Pastor to make sure you (or your loved one) is included in the recognition.

Greetings in Christ! Well, we are under way for 2009 and have had a couple of really good discussions regarding Mission and Outreach for our congregation, and I am excited with the direction God has revealed to us. On the heels of a truly wonderful Easter Egg Hunt at Grand Haven (Thanks to all who prayed and participated), we felt that it would make sense to begin the summer months with an outreach event that focuses on our families and extended families here at Hope. Over the next couple of Sundays we will give each family a copy of the book "My First Catechism." Each family will write their family name on the inside cover of the book with the year. The mother, father, grandparent, or guardian will spend as little or as much time as allowable in the home, reading and explaining to their children and grandchildren what we believe as LCMS Lutherans. It Makes Sense (Cents)

In May we'll be having a stewardship emphasis in our worship services. The goal is for each of us to be more aware of God's Word on the subject and how we fit into God's plan here at Hope Lutheran. Here are the touchstones for the services:

I. GOD'S STEWARDS ARE GOD'S STEWARDS.

God's stewards are stewards by virtue of creation and their re-creation in Holy Baptism; therefore, they belong to the Lord.



II. GOD'S STEWARDS ARE MANAGERS, NOT OWNERS.

God's stewards have been entrusted by God with life and life's resources and given the privilege of responsibly and joyfully managing them for Him.

III. GOD'S STEWARDS ARE SAINTS AND SINNERS.

God's stewards rejoice in and live out what God has declared them to be through the cross. At the same time His stewards recognize they are sinners who fight sin and its consequences each day.

IV. GOD'S STEWARDS ARE LOVED AND LOVING WHO ARE ARE SERVED AND SERVING.

God's stewards recognize that their stewardship flows out of God's act of love for them in Christ which empowers then, in turn, to love others in acts of Christ-like love. God's stewards recognize that their stewardship involves a Gospel-powered style of life which is demonstrated in servanthood within all the arenas of life.

V. GOD'S STEWARDS LIVE WITH AN AWARENESS OF THE PRESENT AND FUTURE, OF TIME AND ETERNITY.

God's stewards live intentionally in the light of God's eternal purpose while being firmly committed to His rule in the here and now.
